

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WEXTRA // VACATIONS GRANTED

The Management has just released the procedures for vacations; and knowing how anxious everyone is to receive this information, we have issued this E X T R A edition.

The procedures are as follows:

For Engineering Departments and General Offices:

One (1) days vacation for every month employed by Librascope, Incorporated in the year 1941.

For example:

- (1) If you worked all twelve (12) months during the year 1941 you receive twelve (12) working days with pay plus two (2) Sundays for a vacation.
- (2) If you worked only six (6) months during the year 1941 you will receive one week with pay.

For Production Departments:

One (1) days vacation for every two (2) months employed in the year 1941.

I should like very much to speak to you all again, particularly at this time, but I find that my desires in this respect are always offset with the knowledge that every single minute of your time is far too valuable to our Country's needs for War Production. For this reason, I will attempt to convey my message to you through these printed columns.

I am greatly pleased that you people have the spirit and the initiative that makes this paper possible. It is that type of attitude -- that spirit of willingness to do more than your share, that wins a war.

I know it is not necessary for me to say that some of our recent experiences have been heartbreaking. We have all shared heavily in these disappointments. But amid all these depressing conditions, I have observed certain things which have brought good cheer to me, and I want to pass them along to you in order that you too may see the approaching dawn of better days.

Adjustment procedures have been developed to a point where it now takes less than half the time to completely adjust and inspect each instrument compared to the time required for the first part of this year.

Assembly work has been organized and systematized to an extent which surpasses all expectations. Considering the many changes in design we have been forced to make the control over matters in this department is really gratifying. There is every evidence that the time required for assembling each instrument will decrease by a large percentage over our previous records.

Perhaps you all do not appreciate how much it means to the management of any company to see parts coming through on time and correctly made. I am more than proud to say that there has been a drastic improvement in the daily inspection reports which tell the story of more parts being made on time with much less rework and very little scrap. All these things are the direct result of better co-ordination, and it signifies that our Production Control Department is getting a death grip on those things which cause delay and waste.

I am proud to note that during the past fortnight our Specifications Department turned out the first real manufacturing specifications this company has ever had. And this is only one of the many good things which has come from this newly organized group.

Certainly we must all have observed how nicely our drawings are coming out. Not only are they coming through on schedule but they are noteworthy for accuracy. This is a tremendously big step forward.

In the Model Shop I have observed that the work is up to schedule but that is not all. There have been many additional items completed which were not shown on the schedule and yet the amount of overtime has decreased.

Our Development Group continues to accomplish the impossible with even greater speed and good cheer.

The Accounting Department has been able to get their statements out on time -- thanks to you all for your co-operation,

The Stockroom personifies orderliness and their records balance.

The Purchasing Department has organized a very efficient system and outside production is coming under better control.

I am grateful to those who sent us Mr. Brownell. I am sure that all of you must have sensed his true spirit of co-operation and helpfulness. It is difficult to evaluate the amount of good he has already done for us, but I assure you that it is of great magnitude.

From stem to stern, from top to bottom, you have demonstrated your abilities - your co-operation and your spirit of determination. With your continued help this war will be WON -- and I am truly grateful.
