While, unfortunately, this happens frequently whenever rapid expansion occurs, it still is an act which favors our ensmies. In reality, when we have more people than we need to do a certain task, we are keeping part of these people from doing other work useful to our Government's

needs.

It behooves each one of us them, if we are red-blooded Americans, to see that Uncle Sam is getting his full share of our effort to help win the war; and it becomes the patriotic duty of each person in any supervisory capacity to budget the time in his department to see that the work goes out on time. It goes without saying that the work must be correct or it will surely come back, resulting in more lost time and further gains to our enemies.

Far too many people still believe that wars are won or lost only by those in uniform. They have not yet learned that in total war the fighting line begins in our factories; yes, even in the minds of our great engineers. We, who are engaged in war production, are fighting for our country's freedom just as much as the boys on the firing line; and yet we do not have to endure the physical torture nor give up our comforts at home. #### SYNTHETIC RUBBER PROGRAM INCREASES BY WPB

WPB has approved an increase in its synthetic rubber program from 800,000 tons the Western Regional office was advised this week (July 27).

The INCREASE WILL BE OBTAINED WITH NO EXPENDITURE OF CRITICAL MATERIALS for CON-STRUCTION PURPOSES, and is due to advanced engineering in the production of butyl rubber. The new techniques permit an increase of 70,000 tons in the formerly planned 60,000 - ton capacity of plants already under construction.

The expanded program is not expected to alter the projected figure of 800 tons of butyl rubber to be produced in 1942. The increase does not change the current picture, and the facts on the rubber situation indicate, as has been said before, that THERE IS NO RUBBER TO SPARE FOR NON-ESSENTIAL PURPOSES.

Butyl rubber has been found to be extremely useful in the manufacture of gas masks, anti-gas clothing, raincoats, rubber boots, life preservers, barrage balloons, wire insulations, and miscellaneous molded goods. It is also being experimented with for use in tires, although indications are it is not equal to Buna S synthetic rubber for tire purposes.

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## CENSORSHIP

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#### THE WELFARE FUND

We have been asked by several of the personnel this last week when a couple of collections were made for flowers, etc., why we didn't have a welfare fund to take care of these little niceties. We advised them that the employees' organization did have a welfare fund, but that it has been in the red for several months due to the fact that everybody hasn't been co-operating. What do we mean by co-operating?

Just five little words will explain 
"Pay for your soft drinks".

We know it must be hard to realize that a few employees taking drinks without paying for them would put the welfere fund in the red - but it's true. For example, out of 12 cases of drinks purchased last week, only 7-1/2 cases were asscumted for in the cash box. This means that 106 bottles of beverage were taken without being paid for. Let's see how that adds up. The profit on one bottle of beverage is 1 2/3¢. Out of this we have to allow for ice to keep the drinks cool, so naturally if only 7-1/2 cases out of 12 cases are paid for, it is not hard to realize why the welfare fund would be in the

red.

However, if everybody paid for their drinks, we would make a profit of 40% a case, less ice consumption, which, in addition to the money from the candy machine, would bring our welfare fund out of the red and give us some money with which to make kindly gestures which we all enjoy so much. This would also save those who make the collections considerable embarrassment, for they don't appreciate "dunning" employees for a nickel or a dime every time they turn around.

We fully realize that "Pay for your soft drinks" doesn't affect everybody, but the thing that does affect us all is bringing our welfare fund out of the red, which is impossible to do unless we all co-operate. If we don't co-operate, we will even be deprived of drinks, because at the present time we are continually showing a loss in the welfare fund; and if we don't start making a profit pretty soon, we'll never catch up. If you don't have the change, get it from the guard. If you don't have the money, don't get the drink:

So let's all pay for our drinks, and see if we can't bring our welfare fund out of the red, so we can use this fund for books, flowers, etc.

## FORTUNES MADE BY BOGUS BRAINS

(Beware of the "Clever Invention" Man)

Several cases heard in the criminal courts recently show that an old swindle-extracting money from the public for the purpose of working a marvelous invention - is again being practiced extensively.

The inventions used to defraud the unwary are, as usual, of two classes - practicable and impracticable. Those that can be worked are offered by imitators of Alfred Paraf, a pioneer in this form of swindle. It is a remarkable fact that but for him margarine might have been almost unknown today. He stole the process from the French Patent Office, took it to America and ultimately caused to be put on the market there a butter substitute that sold like hot cakes. While the manufacturers were making money fast, the inventor, who till then had got nothing out of his patent, turned up, and they paid him a large sum. Paraf disappeared; but then margarine was "on the map".

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## A RUBBER FRAUD

Among inventions used to exploit the public are processes for manufacturing precious stones and gems from common materials and for making substitutes for natural products. Generally these processes, when they work at all, yield something that costs more than the commodity it is intended to supplant.

Of late years a favorite medium for this kind of "ramp" has been artificial rubber, in connection with which thousands of people have been duped. A man who was remarkably successful - up to a point - in exploiting the public by means of it turned to bigger game after swindling a number of small investors. Renting a mill in one of the Channel Islands he appeared to make first-class commercial rubber there, and then approached financiers.

Each in turn engaged scientific chemists to inquire into the process. The latter examined the raw materials, saw every stage of the process, prowled round the mill at night to see if raw rubber was brought into the place and melted down into the sheets said to be made outright by the inventor and bribed the workmen employed by him. All reported

favorably on the great discovery, and nine capitalists acquired - unknown to each other, of course - a half share in it, one of them paying \$50,000.

In an attempt to bring the latest facts before the personnel of Librascope, Incorporated, your editor is printing the following article from the latest issue of the "WAR PRODUCTION NEWS".

"In order to clarify the situation regarding the present status of the synthetic rubber program, Rubber Coordinator, Arthur B. Newhall, has released the following statement - 'There has been a great deal of controversy over this situation, and many questions have been asked concerning the program. This statement provides answers to practically all of the pertinent questions which may properly be raised. No attempt is made to single out specific questions, usually raised by special interests, which apply to a single phase of the program. The entire situation must be considered as a whole, with all of the factors in proper proportion, and with the vitally important objectives constantly in mind. It is believed this statement will provide an answer to all of the questions which may properly be raised. The latest . available information of the synthetic rubber situation leads us to these conclusions:

"The Government is now building plants based on a program for the production of synthetic rubber as follows:

7000,000 tons per year of Buna S. 60,000 tons per year of butyl. 40,000 tons per year of neoprene.

"The present program has been fixed at this amount, not because we are still searching for methods or processes, but because the amount of raw material required to build plants to use any of the processes is limited, and the amount allotted is all that can be spared at this time to be taken away from other critical needs in the war program. Confusion arising from the public statements of different proponents of different processes has not in the least detracted from the general policy of going forward with this program to completion at the earliest possible moment.

"'Buna S, which is a general purpose rubber, is made by a chemical combination of butadiene and styrene. Butadiene can be made from either alcohol or petroleum and many of

the questions regarding the present program arise on account of this fact. Prior to the declaration of war, petroleum was chosen as the base material from which to manufacture synthetic rubber for three reasons: The more advanced experimental development of the process in this country, the substantially lower cost of production, and the apparent lack of increasing defense demand.

"After the outbreak of war, comparative costs were not important. Rubber was essential, and speed was the first consideration. Our principal crude supply was cut off. An increased synthetic program was entered into. This program embraced all available alcohol which could be released from other war needs at that time and as more alcohol became available, because of domestic wartime measures, the proportion of alcohol to be used in the program was increased. Thirty per cent of the butadiene included in the present program is being made from alcohol and most of the remainder from petroleum.

"When you start a new industry many rapid changes take place. This has been particularly true with synthetic rubber and important changes are still going on. As an illustration, at the outset, in spite of its ultimate increased cost over petroleum, the alcohol process required less strategic material for building new plants; that is, unless you had to go back and build a plant to get alcohol. Already, however, a new petroleum method has been worked out, and today the amount of strategic material, with either process, is practically on an equal basis.

but we are satisfied that all who have a part in the undertaking are doing their best to accomplish the one thing in which the American people are interested — to be sure that enough rubber is made available, regardless of its source, for carrying on the war effort and supplying essential civilian needs. Today the program is set as we have outlined.
