Librascope Growth Signs Evident

Librascope is growing, and the positive signs are everywhere.

In August, the Engineering Department expanded into the new office building, (Bldg. -5) erected in the parking lot adjacent to Bldg. 1. This building houses TCS, TCT, and SST program offices and technical support personnel, including the TCS Software Support Center.

"But that was only the first step of the expansion program. said Jerry Deitz, VP & Chief Engineer.

The Engineering group will now expand across Western Avenue into a new Librascope facility. Formerly occupied by the Pepsi Cola Bottling Co., the new building (Bldg. 6) will provide 22,000 square feet of office and laboratory space. This building will house all Naval Weapon System program staff and technical support personnel. In addition, the Advanced Display Group under Dr. Robert Tsai, will be relocated to Bldg. 6 from Bldg. 2.

"The continued growth of the Engineering Department to support ongoing programs, as well as prepare for new programs due to start within the next three to six months, necessitates additional facilities to house new employees," said Deitz.

Other positive signs of Librascope's growth position are visible. Employee strength is up to 1,172, a gain of 22% over last year, and according to Frank Yapp, VP Personnel & Organization, there are requisitions for another 90 new hires. While Librascope's existing programs remain firm and business bookings are running ahead of business plan forecasts, there is no time for complacency.

Employees Pledge \$70,555 In United Way Campaign

Librascope's 1981 Aid Club/United Way campaign, conducted throughout the plant during the month of October, resulted in pledges of \$70,555 to the Los Angeles County United Way.

The Product Assurance department led the way with 73% participation, followed by Administration, Engineering and Logistics—all 70%, and Manufacturing—65%. Total Librascope participation was 68%; more than half of the contributors were "Fair Share" sign-ups.

Logistics - Logistics, Writing/Editing, Publications Production and Management Tech Support.

In all, 801 employees contributed to the charitable campaign. The average donation was more than \$88 per contributor.

Monies collected from Dept. 21-613, Newport, RI office, will be sent to the United Way of Southeastern New England. Librascope introduced its new Laser Liquid Crystal Military Display Systems this past June at the 34th Paris Air Show, held in Le Bourget (Paris), France. The display systems were a key attention-getter at the world's largest aerospace and military equipment exposition.

The system employs the use of a new type laser-addressed liquid crystal light valve to project realtime, high-resolution, multicolor displays. Projection may be implemented either in a selfcontained rear-projection unit or in a large screen front-projection configuration.

According to Ernest T. Pool, Librascope Marketing Vice President, the systems are ideal for both tactical and strategic display applications, which include the rapid updating of battlefield situations, management of combatant logistics and tactical data, the overlay of computer generated data upon maps and charts, and shipboard navigational plotting.

The Librascope exhibit included an operational prototype display system, which performed daily for large numbers of curious and delighted visitors. Coupling together the latest state-of-the-art in laser and liquid crystal technologies, the new Librascope systems have already evoked a large degree of world-wide interest.



Going to Night School? Librascope's Tuition Refund Program Helps

Full-time Librascope employees who are currently attending school after work or who may wish to further their formal education in their spare time are encouraged to investigate the Tuition Refund Program.

"This program is available to all full-time employees and covers any college level course leading to a certificate or degree determined to be clearly of benefit to the company," said Frank Yapp, VP Personnel and Organization.

"For a degree program, the Tuition Refund covers 100% of tuition and required laboratory fees and 50% of the cost of books," Yapp said. "For a certificate or associate degree program the coverage is slightly less (75% and 50%) but in any case it's a great opportunity.

Here's how the program works:

Employees eligible for veteran's assistance under various public laws must utilize such assistance to the full extent. If such benefits should be less than the amount provided by the Tuition Refund Program, an employee will be entitled to receive the difference.

The Education Committee will not approve reimbursement for any courses which are judged to represent too heavy a scholastic load. Limiting approval is intended to protect the health, job performance and scholastic achievement of the employee-student.

Form 3225, Application for Tuition Refund, must be completed for each course for which reimbursement is requested, and forwarded to the Employment and Training section at least ten days prior to start of the course for final approval by the Education Committee.

The following are excluded from the reimbursement plan:

1. Attendance in individual courses not applicable to a certificate or degree, unless such as a normal job-training activity, in which case the Company may pay the entire cost directly to the institution.

2. Fellowship programs requiring attendance during the normal working hours, either part-time or fulltime.

3. Correspondence courses, except college courses specifically required for an applicable degree where such courses are only offered during working hours or by correspondence.

4. Semi-educational activities such as conventions, conferences, and seminars offered by Dale Carnegie, The American Management Association, etc.

The reimbursement formula for approved college-level courses follows

Certificate or Associate Degree Program: 75% of tuition or registration fees and required laboratory fees, and 50% of the cost of books (\$800 maximum reimbursement in any consecutive 12-month period.)

Degree Program: 100% of tuition and required laboratory fees, and 50% of the cost of books (100% to a maximum of \$800 and 50% for any expenses above \$800.)

No payment will be made for student service fees, periodicals, extracurricular activities, parking, or travel for either program.

Tuition refunds will be processed by the Training section upon receipt of an official grade report (grade of "C" or better), along with satisfactory proof of payment.

Further information on Librascope's Tuition Refund Program may be found in the Manager' Manual, a copy of which is on file with each supervisor.


