Librascope has been awarded a contract to carry out the Advanced Development phase for the U.S. Army's Communications Control System (CCS).

The CCS is a highly intelligent front-end communications processor to be used with artillery tactical data systems.

Hank Pinczower, Director, Army Programs, notes that design of the CCS will permit its use with existing and planned Army communications system beyond the year 2000.

Administered by the U.S. Army Electronics Command, Ft. Monmouth, New Jersey, the initial contract is for \$3.5 million and covers the delivery of six test type CCS's over a contract span of 20 months.

New Incentives Added To Savings Bond Program

"This year, however," she added, "Congress is expected to pass legislation which will link the yield on saving bonds to the interest rates on Treasury securities. This will provide a rate of interest more consistent with the market and should provide a new incentive for employees to put part of their savings in savings bonds."

Literature and posters describing the benefits of the new U.S. Savings Bonds were distributed during the campaign so that every employee had an opportunity to sign up.

Another successful Winter League of bowling has just drawn to a close and for some 122 Librascope bowlers, it was one of the best seasons ever.


Librascope had 10 teams in Tuesday night Mixed-5 competition and 24 teams in Thursday night Trio competition. All games were played at Grand Central Bowl.

Two sessions will be held. Session 1 will have classes on Monday and Wednesday from 3:45 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. Session 2 classes will be on Tuesday and Thursday from 4:15 p.m. to 5:15 p.m. Both sessions will run for 10 weeks, two classes per week.

The cost of the program will be \$40 per person with \$20 refundable upon completion of 15 of the 20 classes. Achievement awards will be presented to successful participants.

The physical fitness classes will be structured as follows: warm-up (stretching); muscle toning; aerobic endurance; coordination (balance); and cool down. Nutrition and related health information will be discussed during the classes as well.

Telecommunications is Meeting the Challenge Of Librascope's Growth

Librascope's rapid growth in recent months has placed quite a strain on the Telecommunications Department, but according to Gordon Madsen, Manager of Telecommunications, employees within the department are meeting the challenge in typical Librascope fashion.

"With more new people, more new buildings and the dramatic growth in our volume of mail, we were faced with daily confusion concerning where new people were located...and how to get the mail to them," Madsen explained.

Telecommunications' new "Mail Stop" system, developed by Tony Sanchez, Group Leader of Records & Mail Room, is meeting the challenge

Here's how it works.

Each mail delivery location now has a "Mail Stop" number instead of the previous department location description. Stickers with the Mail Stop number are posted at each mail location.

"That Mail Stop number

becomes your 'return address'," says Sanchez. "Use it faithfully. and your mail cannot go astray, even if the mail delivery clerk is new on the job.'

Sanchez emphasized that Mail Stop numbers must be used on all correspondence - including your return address on outgoing U.S. Mail-if the system is to work properly.

To assist employees in using the new Mail Stop numbers, a complete listing of numbers will be included in a new Communications Directory, scheduled for distribution in mid-June.

"In the new directory we will list all the usual information such as employee names, departments and buildings, telephone extensions, etc., plus the Mail Stop number for each name," Sanchez explained.

"If you should fail to find the Mail Stop number you are seeking, please call the Mail Room, Ext. 1273, and we will help you locate it quickly," he said.
