SFCS Mk 1 Mod 15I To Undergo Sea Trials in Indian Ocean

Set-to-Work and Harbor Accepttance Trials are presently being conducted at the Bombay Naval Shipyard on the I.N.S. SHAKLI, with sea trials to follow, on the first submarine constructed in India, employing the Librascope-built Submarine Fire Control System Mk 1 Mod 15I.

This will complete the installation and final testing of three out of four SFCS Mk 1 Mod 15I systems built by Librascope for the Indian Navy, under a subcontract received from Howaldtswerke-Deutsche Werft (HDW), a shipbuilding firm in West Germany.

The first two submarines were built by HDW in Germany. The I.N.S. SHAKLI was built by the Indian Navy in Bombay, India.

The first two SFCS Mk 1 Mod 15I systems successfully completed sea trials in 1987 aboard the I.N.S. SHISH-UMAR and the I.N.S. SHANKUSH, in the Baltic and North Seas. The fourth submarine will undergo testing next year. Librascope engineering and field service personnel are supporting the tests in India.

Free Cancer Education and Screening Available to Employees

Free cancer education and screening will be available to employees, retirees, and family members, through the Mobile Screening Unit sponsored by the City of Hope National Medical Center and the American Cancer Society.

The program will be presented in two parts. The first part focuses on education about the major cancers; specifically the signs, symptoms and high risk characteristics related to the types of cancer which affect males and females – skin, lymphatic, thyroid, breast, testicular, prostate, cervical and colon-rectal.

Participants will learn how to do self examination for early detection of cancer, and learn preventive methods to prevent cancer.

The second part of the program is thephysical screening examination by City of Hope medical personnel.

The free cancer education meeting will be held on Tuesday, August 14, from 4 to 5 pm, in the California Rm. Reservations are required for this meeting. Call the Employee Services Office, X-1210.

The free cancer screening will be held at Librascope on August 21, 22 and 23, from 9 am to 3:30 pm.


Appointments for the cancer screening will be given at the education meeting and only to those who attend the educational program.

The screening examination for women consists of a clinical examination of the breast, skin, lymphatic, thyroid, rectal, pelvic with pap smear (on request), and occult blood test (on request). The entire examination requires approximately fifteen minutes.

The screening for men consists of a clinical examination of the thyroid, skin, lymphatic, prostate, testicular, rectal, and occult blood test (on request). The men's examination requires only ten minutes.



The Mobile Screening Unit was founded by the American Cancer Society and is now operated as a joint venture with the City of Hope National Medical Center located in Duarte. Its purpose is to promote early detection and prevention of cancer, which can save many lives each year.



Bite Size Tips on Preventive Dining

There is no cancer-free guarantee, but some foods reduce your risk . . .

- **Eat five servings of fruits** and vegetables every day.
- Choose at least one that is high in vitamin A (such as carrots, spinach or cantaloupe).
- Be sure one is rich in vitamin C (grapefruit, cauliflower, oranges).
- Eat at least one high-fiber food each day (corn, figs, apples).
- Choose something from the cabbage family several times a week (broccoli, brussels sprouts, cauliflower).
- Servings don't have to be large. The variety is important.
- Avoid processed foods eat foods as close to fresh as you can.
- If you eat meat, buy the leanest possible. Choose low-fat milk and dairy products.
- Eat legumes regularly (peas, beans).

Computer Corner by Carey Capaldi

This is the second in a series of articles on UNIX utilities and C-shell programming, written by Carey Capaldi, Supvr., Network Administration and Support. This article will demonstrate how to use the <u>sort</u> utility. "I do not have space to demonstrate all the possible combinations of arguments, but will attempt to demonstrate some useful ones," said Capaldi.

The first thing you will need is a file to experiment with, then type the following use **tabs** between entries:

%cat>test.nl							
R5	1	sig1					
R6	2	/sig2					
R7	1	sig1					
R5	2	sig3					
R6	1)	sig3					
C8	1	sig1					
C8	2	sig3					

<control - d>

(press and hold the "control" key and press the "d" key)

This will create a file named **test.nl** which contains a small connection list or net list. Verify the file exists.

%cat test.nl

The contents you typed above should be displayed on the screen. We are now ready to proceed with the **sort** command. We will sort this list in three ways:

- 1. Sort by reference designator only this is the first field (ex R5).
- 2. Sort by signal this is the last field (ex sig1).
- 3. Sort and unique by reference designator.

Sort by reference designator only. The sort command has a way which you can control the field sorted on. The following demonstrates this.

%sort +0-1 test.nl

The +0-1 indicates to sort that the first field is to be sorted, **sort** numbers fields starting with 0. Next let's sort by signal: **%sort +2 test.nl**

The output should have field 3 sorted. Next, let's get a unique list: **%sort -u +0 -1 test.nl**

Your output should have only one entry per reference designator. Try it again but pipe it into the **cut** utility retaining only field 1 and redirect the output to a file.

%sort -u +0 -1 test.nl / cut -f1 > test.parts

You have a list of component reference designators in a file by the name of test.parts. You will notice cut refers to fields with the **-f** and the count starts with 1.

%cat test.parts

This wraps up some examples with **sort** and one quick example of how to use **cut**. For further information refer to the **man** pages which are online, (% **man sort** - % **man cut**). 


LIBRASCOPE EMPLOYEES TO 'STAR' AT UNIVERSAL STUDIOS
