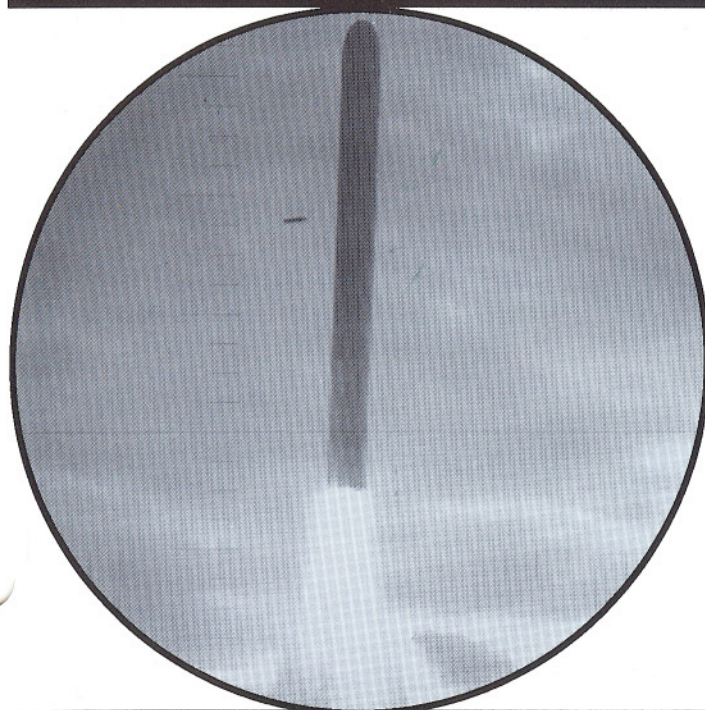

Librascope designed, developed and produced the system for control and vertical launch of TOMAHAWK cruise missiles from Los Angeles Attack Class Submarines.

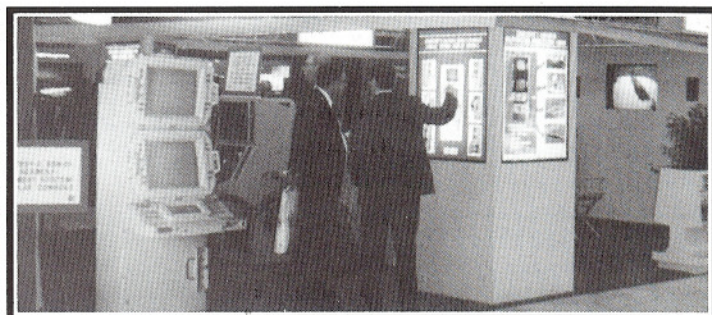

This increment of software is crucial to the successful completion of General Electric's System Response Time (SRT) Critical Item Test scheduled for later this year.

Workshop needs your newspapers: The Glendale Self Aid Workshop currently employs 45 developmentally disabled adults, ages 22-43, who perform jobs contracted by local businesses which include assembly, sorting, packaging, collating, etc. Several of their major clients require newspaper which the Workshop sells to them after the paper has been sorted, stacked, folded, and tied into 20 lb rolls. Contributions of newspapers from the community has recently dropped due to other recycling programs now available to individuals. Collection boxes for newspaper will be located at the Main Gate, B-8 rear lobby, and on the B-17 patio.

Security Department Asks For Cooperation in Registering Vehicles

The Librascope Security Department has completely automated its vehicle registration records for those employees who register their vehicles with Security. According to Jack Dyer, Manager, this new procedure eliminates the need for identification stickers and allows the Security Department to contact employees in the event they have left their lights on, parked in unauthorized areas, or have had some

damage occur to their vehicle while parked in the Company parking lot.

"This also enables us to more quickly identify abandoned vehicles and have them removed from our property," said Dyer. "We have had to remove 10 cars which were abandoned in our parking lot so far this year."

IT MAY SAVE YOUR LIFE!

In keeping with the Company's policy to provide a safe and secure work environment for its employees, a new **Emergency Procedures** handbook will be distributed to every employee during the week of May 28-31.

The handbook was prepared by the Librascope Safety Department under the direction of Sal Molina, Safety and Environmental Coordinator.

Employees are asked to review and become familiar with the contents of the handbook which covers emergency instructions and preventive measures and controls in dealing with fire, medical, earthquake, chemical spills, utility failures, violent or criminal behavior, evacuation procedures, and emergency procedures.

It also contains maps of each building showing evacuation routes, location of fire extinguishers, oxygen masks, and fire hoses.

To make certain that every employee receives an **Emergency Procedures** handbook, a receipt has been included with each handbook which must be signed by the employee and returned to the Human Resources Dept., Mail Stop 302.

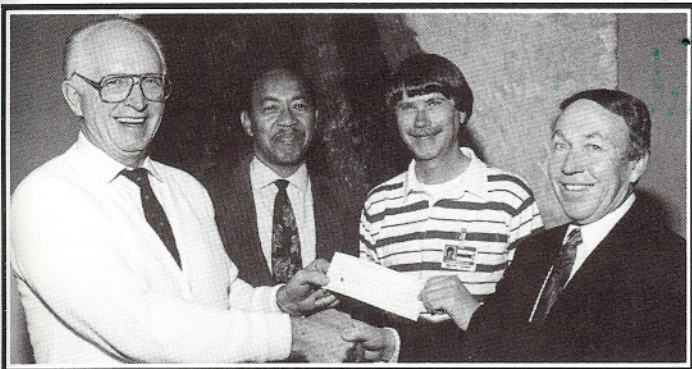

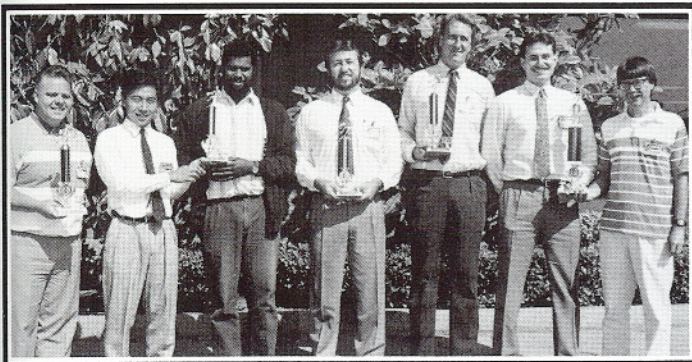

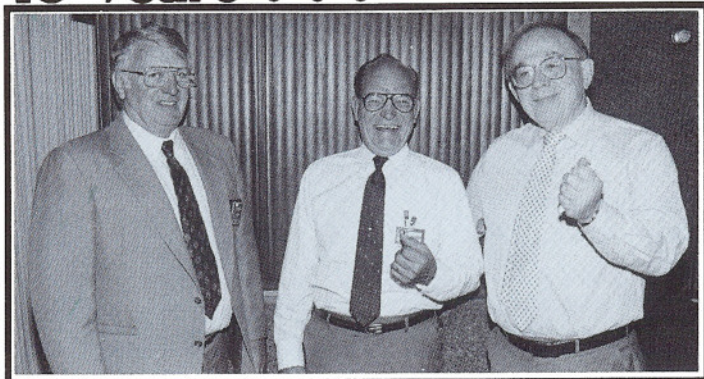
