The first tactical CSDC completed acceptance testing on June 30. This first unit has been shipped in place to GE-Moorestown to support their integration and interface testing. The CSDC will be shipped to Moorestown by mid-July.

The second CSDC is currently in acceptance testing and should be shipped to GE-Syracuse the week of July 8.

Librascope is currently under contract to deliver 58 displays to GE for the AN/BSY-2 and AN/BQG-5 sonar programs at a production rate of approximately three per month. ■

Librascope Awarded Contract For AN/BSY-2 Seawolf Portable Shipboard Control Unit

A \$1.25 million contract has been awarded the Company for the Portable Shipboard Control Unit (PSCU) from the U. S. Navy's David Taylor Research Center in Bethesda, Maryland.

The contract is for the design, breadboard development and fabrication of a prototype PSCU. The PSCU is for use on the Navy's next generation Attack Class Submarine—the SSN-21 SEAWOLF.

The PSCU will be used on the bridge to provide navigation and communication data and to control

the submarine when operating on the surface of the sea.

Librascope's PSCU design will use advanced technology flat panel displays and high speed interfaces to submarine data, including radar, thereby providing a vast improvement over similar equipment currently used on submarines.

LAMP LIGHTS LIBERTY



rederic Auguste Bartholdi,
commissioned to create a monument on
behalf of the people of France as a gift to
the people of America, formally titled his
work, "Liberty Enlightening the World." It
was America's Statue of Liberty.

In 1876, the torch and flame were exhibited at the American Centennial exhibition in Philadellphia and later in Madison Square, New York.

On the Fourth of July, 1884, the completed statue with its torch in place was unveiled and formally presented to the American Minister in Paris by the people of France. And in June, 1885, the Statue of Liberty, packed into more than 200 shipping crates, arrived in New York on the French vessel, Isere.

Dedication ceremonies took place on



October, 1886. After a century of lighting the world for liberty, the original copper structure for the flame was substantially

deformed, resulting in loss of most of its original sculptural quality. Due to extensive corrosion and the ravages of weather resulting in water infiltration, the torch had to be entirely reconstructed. The torch, removed on July 4, 1984, has been retired for museum display. The new one, a duplicate of the original created by Bartholdi,

The statue and the rest of Liberty Island have been restored, along with the historic immigration station on Ellis Island and

continues to "light" liberty.

Liberty Centennial celebrations are scheduled each year for the Fourth of July. ■
