
### "Mickey's Nutcracker" and "Beauty and the Beast" Highlight Happy Holidays at Disneyland

# Season's Greetings!



Librascope has been awarded a contract for \$2.1 million from the Department of Supply and Services, Canada. This contract is to upgrade the Canadian Submarine Fire Control System (SFCS) Mk 1 to incorporate a Plasma Panel replacement for the plotter and to integrate the new Triton Sonar.

One SFCS Mk 1 is now operational in the 'Canadian' lab in Bldg. 3, and will be updated to include the modification.

System acceptance is scheduled for October 1992.

Larry Fox has been named Program Manager.

This Plasma/Triton contract is a continuation of Librascope's long term relationship with the Canadian Government.

The Department of the Navy, Space and Naval Warfare Systems Command (SPAWAR) recently determined that the Navy would save more than \$10 million over the next ten years as a result of a Value Engineering Change Proposal (VECP) that Librascope's Military Products Group initiated four years ago. In accordance with the Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR's) that govern the sharing of value engineering savings between the Government and its contractor(s), Librascope's share will be \$749,481 for the two SPAWAR contracts involved. Librascope has received \$627,297 to date.

While under contract in late 1987 for producing RD-433A/SSH Recorder-Reproducers for the U.S. Navy's UHF SATCOM System, Librascope submitted a major Continued-Pa. 2

VECP to its customer, SPAWAR. This VECP provided for the eventual replacement of the rotating magnetic disk memory in all RD-433/SSH's, with an all solid-state RAM Disk design which was later designated the RD-433A/SSH. The benefits of this change, which was approved on March 2, 1988, included reduced unit cost,

increased reliability, and faster access time.

The negotiated per unit savings was \$30,546. Librascope will receive a royalty equal to 50% of this amount (\$15,273) for each unit shipped during the allowed three year sharing period which concludes this month. During this period, the U.S. Navy also benefitted significantly through third parties that procured 76 additional RD-433A/SSH RAM Disk memories for the UHF SATCOM System. These third parties included the U. S. Navy Ships Parts Control Center (NSPCC), Bath Iron Works, Litton Data Systems, Ingalls Ship-

try. It was Librascope's perseverance, however, that got it through the four year obstacle course. Aside from the personal satisfaction and the reward that Librascope will now receive, I think we can all take pride in knowing that the Navy now has a better product for \$10 million less. This is true value engineering!"

### 1992 FICA & SDI **Tax Information**

The 1992 FICA social security taxable wage base will be \$55,500, an increase of \$2,100 over the 1991 base of \$53,400. The new 1992 Medicare taxable wage base ("Hospital Insurance" portion) will be \$130,200. Tax rates for an employee's wages for 1992 will be 6.2% for social security and 1.45% for the Medicare/Hospital Insurance portion of the tax, and a matching amount from the employer.

For SDI purposes, the tax base will be \$31,767 in 1992. The new SDI rate is 1.25% as compared to 1.0% for 1991. The maximum amount of SDI tax payable by an employee will be \$397.08. This is \$79.41 more than the \$317.67 maximum paid in 1991.
